Further, media campaigns that challenge harmful stereotypes and promote gender equality can help shift cultural perceptions. Empowering women through education, employment, and financial independence is a powerful tool to reduce violence. When women have the resources and support to stand up against violence, they can break the cycle of dependency and exploitation. Holding perpetrators accountable is another important aspect. No amount of legal protection will work if perpetrators of violence continue to escape punishment. Society must reject any form of leniency for those committing violence against women, and swift, strong legal consequences must become the norm.

The fight against violence toward women requires more than just legal reforms-it demands a societal transformation. There is a need to create an environment where women can live with dignity, safety, and equality. Only then can the nation fully realize its potential.
